Personal Protective Equipment Requirements

The following rules regarding personal protective equipment will apply for several hands-on classes. If "Personal Protective Equipment Requirements Apply" is indicated in the class description, students must provide the following equipment in order to participate. No exceptions will be made unless noted in the class description.

Personal Protective Equipment must include:

- Helmet (NFPA compliant)
- Protective Hood
- Coat with liner (NFPA compliant)
- Pants with liner (NFPA compliant) (Note: ¾ length boots are not approved in place of pants.)
- · Fire fighting boots
- Gloves (Cal OSHA or NFPA compliant)
- Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus with spare cylinder. Note: Cylinders under current hydrostatic test will be refilled at no cost; however the Fire Service Training Bureau is unable to fill oxygen cylinders.

Individuals with beards, sideburns or other hairstyles that interfere with the proper seal of a breathing apparatus face piece will not be allowed to participate in classes requiring SCBA use.

Protective hoods over beards are not approved.

Assessment Based Training: Maximizing the Time None of Us Have

Presented by: Josh Bennett, Training Officer Ames Fire Department

Can we do what we say we can do? Whether volunteer or paid, structuring a hands-on training program around locally validated and timed standards is a more efficient use of your members time and talents. Drawing from the medical model of quarterly skills evaluations, explore one fire departments use of company level evaluations for our most frequently used fireground tasks. This will be a critical review of a program developed by the instructor, how it has benefited the department, and more importantly, ways it can be improved.

- Gain an understanding of the concept of "Mental Capacity" and its influence on decision making while performing physical tasks. Identify the reasons to incorporate skill proficiency testing in your paid or volunteer department.
- Review the process used to develop an assessment-based training program.
- Explore the development and validation process of standards relevant to your own jurisdiction verses using "national standards in a can".

Building an Aggressive Engine Company

Presented by: Ty Wheeler, Firefighter/Paramedic, Johnston-Grimes Metro Fire Department

Fires are won and lost by the ability of the first-due engine to place the line at the seat of the fire, enabling the crew to stretch the line and make the push starts with an aggressive mindset supported by the setup of our apparatus. As our environment continues to reach flashover quicker, implementation of an efficient engine crew is imperative to get water on the fire. This course will review the basic Engine Company operations, from apparatus specs to the deployment of the hand lines. This course will enforce the art of firemanship by understanding apparatus, fire flows, and strategies and tactics for successful fireground operations.

FULL Building Construction & Fire Behavior for the Street Smart Firefighter

While there is significant discussion on modern construction, extensive discussion centers around older construction as well.

- Discuss the importance of good communications related to the fire ground
- Discuss modern fire behavior related to building construction

Conducting Live Fire Training in an Acquired Structure

This informative program begins with an overview of the 1403 standard pertaining to live fire training in acquired structure. Participants will concentrate on key positions when conducting live fire training. A case study review of a live fire training in a two-story farmhouse in Southeast Iowa involving multiple fire departments will be the main focus of this workshop. Students will also learn about the 1403 Live Fire Instructor Credentialing program from the International Society of Fire Service Instructors

- Define an acquired structure according to NFPA 1403.
- Describe how to prepare an acquired structure for live fire training.
- Describe the steps of preparing the interior of an acquired structure for live fire training.
- Identify the roles of the instructor-in-charge, the safety officer, and the ignition officer in the decision to ignite the training fire and the actual ignition of the training fire.
- Identify clear learning objectives for live fire training evolutions.

Developing a plan is not difficult and does not require sophisticated technology. We will examine tools from Paper 1.0 to GIS based solutions. The presentation will also review the important relationships with emergency management, public works, law enforcement, and other local/county/state based partners.

FULL Heart & Lungs: A Hands-on Skills & Dissection Lab

Presented by:

Brandon Kooiker, BSN, RN, CEN, NRAEMT, LRS Healthcare, and FSTB Field Instructor; Sam Patterson, PM, CCP, Pleasant Hill Fire Department, West Des Moines EMS/IA EMS Alliance

This class combines educational materials with a hands-on approach that explains emergent interventions and resuscitation techniques. This will educate and explain the most demanding skills you need to make a difference. We will cover patient assessment, bleeding control, BLS & ALS ventilation management, and thoracic decompression. Using dissection techniques, participants will identify, visualize, and explore the anatomy of the heart and lungs while better understanding the more common medical and traumatic disease processes that EMS providers encounter. Come experience the hands-on of fresh comparative anatomy and review of the heart and lungs.

Students in this class will be charged a \$30.00 resource fee.

This class is designed to reach all levels of the fire service from candidate to chief. Using audio, video and photos to emphasize the correlation between proven and sound tactics and the modern fire environment, the class is designed to encourage discussion with regards to those issues. Discussion is also focused on History Repeating Events and how those lessons learned are being lost to a lack of experience and emphasis on remembering them.

- Discuss historical tactics that are relevant today (fire attack, ventilation)
- Give examples of history repeating events and why we keep repeating them

Presented by: Cory Macumber, Firefighter, Urbandale Fire Department; Eric Kallem, Assistant Chief, Clive Fire Department

This class discusses the hot topic of Fire/EMS's role during an active threat (shooter) incident to stop the dying. How safe is safe enough? Fire/EMS can no longer allow victims of these horrific incidents to die while we wait for the magic term "scene safe" before we enter and begin treatment. Fire/EMS must integrate with law enforcement and law enforcement must integrate with Fire/EMS, which means we must TALK AND TRAIN with each other to accomplish the mission to stop the killing and stop the dying.
